home base Vickery Towers in order to assemble and install "No Parking" signs around the neighborhood. For another year, residents of Lower Greenville Neighborhood

location and most likely spoken for as adoptions are on a first come, first serve basis. The one little girl had been sent to McKinney. Coffee thermos and blankets in tow the threesome headed north and took their place in line at the McKinney shelter to await the 10am opening.

The happy tale-wagging ending of the story— Mom found a new home as a companion to an older person, the boys found homes in Dallas with young families with children, and a bright, sunny life in a yellow house in Vickery Place awaits 8 week old Phoebe Joanne.


#### IT'S NOT TOO EARLY TO START THINKING ABOUT MOSQUITOES!

That's the message from the City of Dallas. Every one of us can make a difference to break the life cycle of the mosquitoes. It's really very simply but will require you to do a few things:

- · Get rid of old tires, jars, cans, buckets etc..
  They all can hold water and will become a breeding ground for mosquitoes.
- Empty plastic wading pools when not in use. If in use, clean it out weekly.
- · Repair leaky facets and pipes. Mosquitoes only need a fraction of an inch in which to lay and hatch their larva.
- · Change water in birdbaths twice weekly, and scrub out the birdbath to make sure it's free of larva

Approximately 2 weeks after the eggs are laid the mosquitoes are adults. They usually stay within 1 mile of their breeding ground. Don't let your address become theirs!

#### **CUCUMBER AND FETA SALAD**

Spring is here and it is nice to start thinking about some of our favorite hot weather foods. This recipe is great with grilled chicken, or as an appetizer with pita chips. Enjoy!

1 cup crumbled feta feta cheese (4 ounces)

11/2 Tbsp lemon juice

1/4 tsp black pepper

1 ½ cups cubed, seeded & peeled cucumber

1 cup finely chopped red onion

3 Tbsp chopped fresh mint

3 Tbsp chopped fresh dill

8 lemon wedges

Combine feta cheese, lemon juice and pepper. Partially mash with a fork. Add cucumber, onion, mint and dill. Yields 8 servings.

## How to Make Your Fruit and Nut Easter Eggs

- In a saucepan, cook sugar, syrup, and water to 265 degrees.
- Add marshmallow creme and beat until almost firm.
- Add melted shortening, confectioners' sugar, candied fruit, and nuts.
- Mix well, shape eggs by hand and dip in the chocolate.

The eggs will keep 6 to 8 months. Makes 10 eggs.

# Dallas Police Department Volunteer Programs

The Dallas Police Department's Citizen Volunteer Program offers several opportunities for citizens to participate in the Dallas Police Department.

## Requirements are as follows:

- At least 21 years of age
- Successfully complete a background check
- Have a valid Texas Drivers License or Identification card
- No Misdemeanor A or B conviction in the last 5 years or a DWI conviction in the last 10 years
- Complete a one hour volunteer orientation class in addition to the individualized training conducted for each program
- Commit to a minimum of 4 hours of volunteer service each month

## The following are some of the programs available for volunteer citizens:

**CITIZENS OFFERING POLICE SUPPORT (C.O.P.S)** is a program designed to allow the volunteer to assist in office related duties.

**VOLUNTEER IN PATROL (VIP)** is a non-confrontational neighborhood patrol program.

CITIZENS HELPIN IN PARKING SOLUTIONS (C.H.I.P.S) is a special trained volunteer who patrols neighborhood and shopping centers, issuing parking citations for handicap parking violations.

**VOLUNTEER RESPONSE TEAM (VRT)** is a special trained citizen or group of citizens who can respond on short notice to assist officers in the field.

She has a simple but effective landscape that compliments the quaintness of her home. She has two sweeping beds on either side of the porch. The common evergreen plants in the beds are Indian Hawthorne, liriope and the tender green leaves of her summer-blooming daylilies, just emerging. Both beds also contain a Chinese fringe-flower bush. It has incredible purple-green leave all year round and

in the spring it's covered with hot-pink flowers.

On the west side of the house is a beautiful red bud tree in full bloom, and on the east side is a small saucer magnolia tree which just dropped its last flower a few days ago. The wooden steps to the porch are

flanked on either side by pots of red geraniums, as well as in hanging pots over the railing. To finish off the look, comfy patio furniture and adirondack chairs can be found on the porch, just waiting for a visitor.

#### **BUG TALK**

April is a wonderful time of the year. The temperature isn't too bad, the roses are starting to bloom, but, you're also starting to see aphids all over your buds. WAIT!! Don't spray anything on them! Just watch...right about the time you think you can't stand it anymore you'll start to see small black bugs that look like tiny black alligators. They eat aphids! Hundreds of them. Those weird black bugs then attach themselves to the underside of leaves and in a few emerge as ladybugs! Have patience and let nature do her job.

**Plant:** Just about everything now! Roses, warm-season vegetables, trees, summer flowering perennials and herbs.

**Fertilize:** Summer-flowering roses with a good organic product like Bioform. It's excellent on everything. It's a fish & seaweed emulsion and the plants love it. Be sure you only put organic products on plants you intend to eat!

**Prune:** The spring-blooming vines and shrubs after they have flowered.

Remember to water deeply and infrequently!
