DON'T GO UP A BLIND ALLEY!

Keeping grass, trees, brush and other vegetation trimmed around your property will do more than show you care about your home.

Both the Dallas Police Dept. and the Code Compliance Dept. emphasize the importance and necessity of keeping the alley space, whether it is paved or not, behind (or beside) your home clear of brush, unobstructed, and litter free—maintaining the alley will: reduce criminal activity (vagrants or potential burglars cannot hide in overgrown brush); prevent coyotes, stray animals and rodents from nesting or making homes in tall weeds or grass; and keep our neighborhood looking beautiful.

Each homeowner is responsible for the upkeep of their yard, their sidewalks, and their half of the alley way. Not doing so may result in a ticket from the City. Let's not go up a blind alley—keep your property safe, and show you care about your home and your neighborhood.

The police have also recommended to ensure that your house number is clearly visible on your back fence to help in case there are ever any incidents.

SUMMER VACATION

Keep Your Home Safe

It's that time of year, when many families leave town on their summer vacation. As you make plans for that ideal get away, consider your home's safety before you go. Burglars target homes that look empty because it makes the process easier for them. With that in mind, it's important to make it look like your home is occupied while you're away.

Hold your mail, newspaper and package deliveries. A pile of unopened mail, unread newspapers, or packages left on the front porch announces to a would-be burglar that your home is empty and ready for intruders. Or have a neighbor pick these things up for you until you return home.

Make it look like someone's home. You can set timers for your lights, television, and other electronics to turn on and off throughout the day. You want your lights to look natural, as if someone's home. Avoid leaving your lights on the entire time you are gone. This will not only increase your electric bill, but it's also suspicious, since most people don't leave lights on all the time when they're home. If you're going to be out of town for a week or more, hire someone to mow your lawn and trim your hedges, so it looks like someone's around and doing the yard work. Ask a neighbor to park a car in front of your house or in your driveway to make it look like someone's home.

Have Neighbors to Keep an Eye Out. Tell your neighbors how long you'll be gone and ask them to keep an eye out for any suspicious activity at your house. Give them your contact numbers and where you will be, in case of an emergency. Have them call 911 if there is any suspicious activity.

Avoid Social Media. While it may be tempting to share photos on Facebook or tweet about your exciting travels, consider holding off on vacation-related posts. Those you are connected to online are typically your friends, but you never know when your information will get into the wrong hands. A friend of a friend may see your status update and know that your home is vulnerable. Consider waiting to post about your adventures until you get back.

Nix the Spare Key. If your home is being targeted, the first thing a criminal will look for is a spare key. He will look in the standard places: a conspicuous plastic rock, under the mat, or above the door. If you're going on vacation, think about removing the spare key all together until you are home, or leave a key with a neighbor.



GONE SWIMMING

Tietze Park is located on Skillman Avenue between Llano and Vanderbilt Streets. In 1924 the land was acquired by Dallas, when it was on the outskirts of the town. Originally it was called Keith Park but was later called Tietze Park, after W.R. Tietze, Superintendent of Parks for the city from 1896-1933.

A sandstone picnic pavilion was added in 1934. The park also features a community swimming pool, lighted baseball field, tennis court, basketball court, a second ball field also suitable for soccer, picnic area, children's playground, recycling drop-off igloos, a plaza with benches and tables, and more than 75 mature and outstanding oak and live oak trees, cedars. There are a few spectacular kneeling bois d'arc trees, believed to be at least 150 years old.

The park is always a bustle of activity and is set to be even more popular with the opening of the

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new Neighborhood Aquatic Center - pictured below
- which has just opened.
